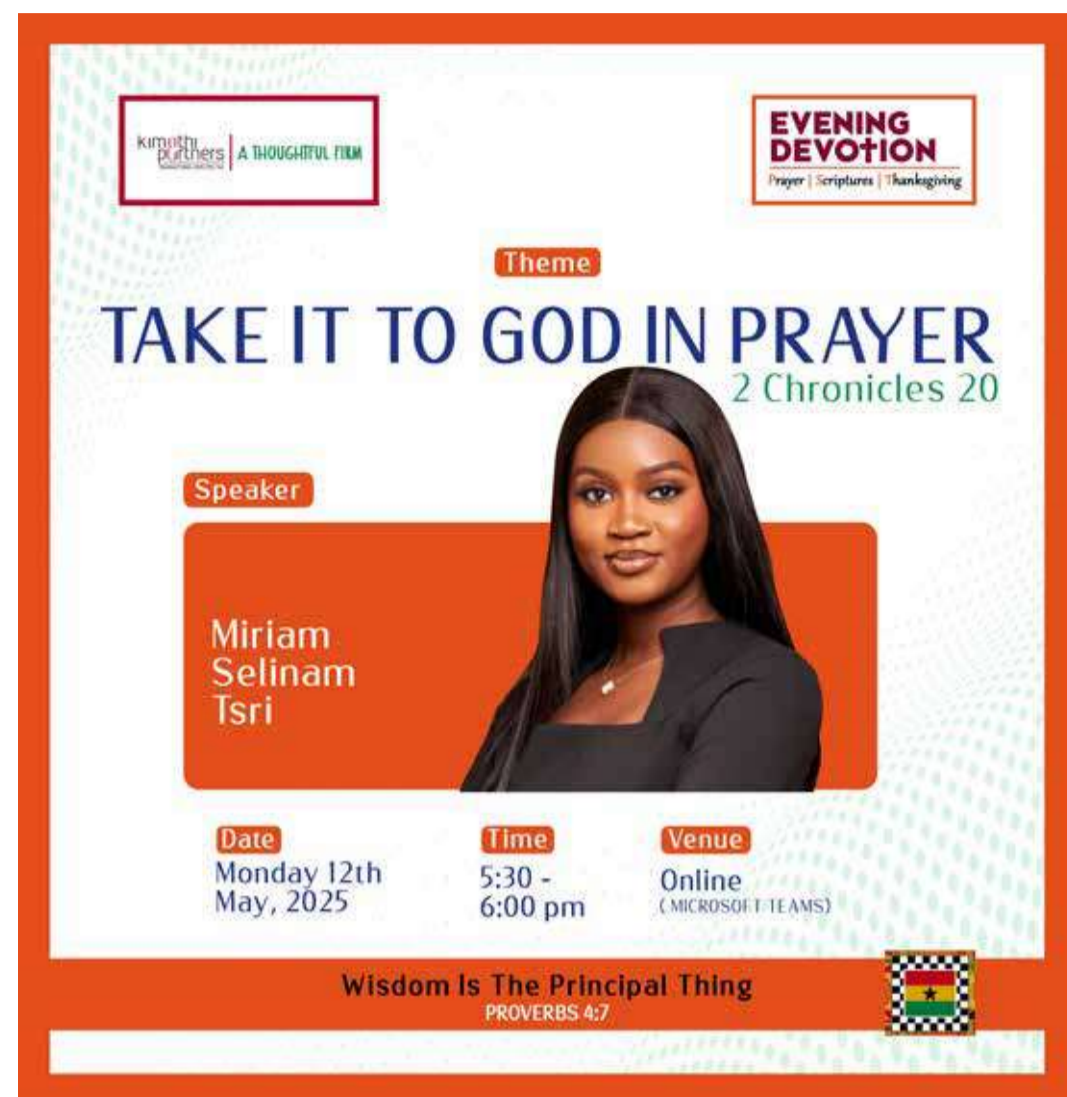

# “TAKE IT TO GOD IN PRAYER” WITH MIRIAM SELINAM TSRI



In yet another soul-stirring instalment of our Evening Devotion series, staff from across the firm came together virtually via Zoom for a time of spiritual renewal and shared reflection. The theme for the evening, drawn from 2 Chronicles 20, was both timely and timeless: “Take It to God in Prayer.”

The guest speaker, Miriam Selinam Tsri, came prepared but what unfolded was far beyond a mere prepared talk. With a presence that was both calm and commanding, Miriam delivered a message that was powerful, passionate, and deeply inspired. From the moment she began to speak, it was clear: she was on fire. Her words flowed not just from her lips, but from the depth of her spirit.

As she spoke, you could feel the virtual room leaning in. Her message was not only rooted in scripture but animated by lived conviction. Many commented afterward that it felt as though time had betrayed them, that just as the spirit was moving, the clock was winding down. Truly, it seemed as though there was much more in her that longed to pour out.

Miriam shared four key takeaways that left a lasting impression:

## 1. Make Prayer a Habit

She urged everyone to approach prayer as a consistent lifestyle, not a last-minute lifeline.

“Prayer isn’t a backup plan,” she said. “It’s our first response and our daily rhythm.”

## 2. God is Always Near

With warmth and assurance, she reminded all present that God is not far removed from our struggles. “He is closer than we think: always near, always listening.”

## 3. Simplicity is Enough

Miriam demystified the act of prayer, emphasizing that God does not require performance, perfection, or elaborate rituals. “A sincere heart is enough,” she said. “God responds to authenticity, not theatrics.”

## 4. Honesty in Brokenness –

In one of the most moving parts of her message, she encouraged attendees to come before God just as they are—wounded, weary, uncertain. “There is no shame in brokenness,” she declared. “In fact, God meets us most intimately when we come to Him undone.”

The atmosphere was electric, yet tender. You could sense that something sacred was taking place—even through screens. When the session came to a close with a collective moment of prayer, it felt more like a pause than an ending. The hunger for more was palpable.

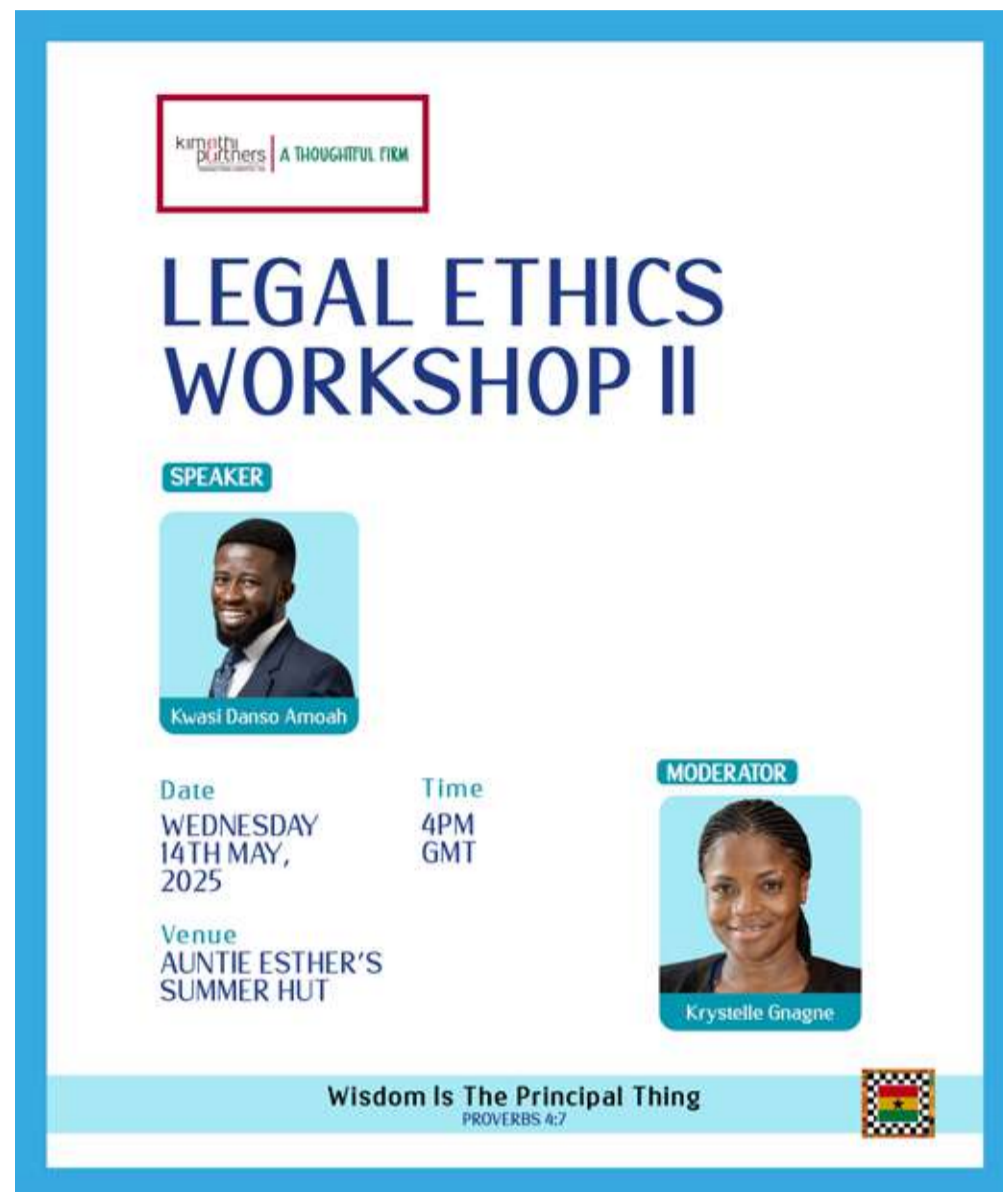

# LEGAL ETHICS WORKSHOP II — A CALL TO CONSCIENCE

May 14, 2025 – Auntie Esther’s Summer Hut

Last week, our community gathered for the much-anticipated Legal Ethics Workshop II, a session that brought thoughtful reflection and compelling insight into the ethical frameworks guiding legal professionals today. The session was masterfully moderated by Krystelle, whose steady hand and sharp facilitation helped steer the conversation through complex terrain with ease.

The highlight of the session was an enlightening presentation by Danso, who led us through a rich and sobering exploration of key anti-corruption laws and their far-reaching implications. Focusing on the United States Foreign Corrupt Practices Act (FCPA), the UK Bribery Act, the Canadian Corruption of Foreign Public Officials Act, and the newly released Code of Conduct for Ghanaian Government Appointees, Danso painted a comprehensive picture of how legal practitioners must remain vigilant no matter where their work takes them.

A powerful message rang through his remarks: “These foreign laws do not stop at the borders.” He reminded us that actions taken within Ghana, or any other jurisdiction, could still fall afoul of these statutes if foreign entities are involved. Even an attempted bribe, under the FCPA, is enough to

trigger liability. His warning was clear: lawyers must not only resist corruption but also be alert to how their conduct, even indirectly, can implicate them and their clients.

On the UK Bribery Act, Danso noted the value and limits of corporate preventative measures. While companies can defend themselves by demonstrating they had adequate procedures in place to prevent bribery, individuals, he stressed, must avoid corrupt practices altogether.

Turning to home soil, Danso walked us through the newly launched Code of Conduct for Ghanaian Government Appointees. Its spirit is one of integrity and accountability which discourages conflicts of interest, prohibiting influence peddling, requiring proper record-keeping, and demanding both civility and confidentiality. Appointees must also declare assets and avoid accepting improper gifts or hampers—reminders that public service must always be about the people, not personal gain.

In a session brimming with takeaways, perhaps the most enduring was Danso’s final word:

“Let your conscience be your guide.”

Indeed, this workshop was more than a legal review, it was a call to ethical clarity in the practice of law. Our sincere thanks to Krystelle and Danso for guiding us through this important conversation. We look forward to continuing this journey of integrity and professional excellence together.

# COURTS WON'T REWRITE YOUR CONTRACT: A LESSON IN CLEAR DRAFTING FROM THE SUPREME COURT

On Thursday, 15th May 2025, the legal team convened for a robust case conference examining the Supreme Court's recent decision in *PVI Group INC. (GH) Limited v. Ghana Airports Company Limited (GACL)*. The session was ably presented by Marylove, with Bernard serving as moderator, guiding participants through a discussion that underlined one of contract law's most enduring truths: courts will not rewrite what parties have failed to express.

## The Dispute: Real Estate Meets Legal Reality

At the heart of the dispute was a 2012 sub-lease agreement concerning a major real estate development at Airport City. PVI claimed that GACL had committed to providing 300 parking spaces to support its high-rise condominium and hospitality project. The non-fulfilment of this, according to PVI, delayed the project and damaged investor confidence.

GACL, on the other hand, argued that while the contract mentioned the parking spaces, it included no binding timeline. PVI's reliance on a 2001 agreement—to which it was not a party—was dismissed as legally untenable.

## The Legal Trajectory: From High Court to Supreme Court

- The High Court sided with GACL, holding that no breach occurred in the absence of a defined timeframe.
- The Court of Appeal upheld this position, cautioning against judicial overreach into contract interpretation.
- Finally, the Supreme Court, in a unanimous ruling on 15th January 2025, affirmed both earlier decisions, reinforcing the sanctity of express terms.

In doing so, the Court reasserted that judges are not contract drafters: if a clause or condition is

missing, it's not the Court's role to fill in the blanks.

## Legal Takeaways: What This Means for Practice

Marylove distilled the judgment into three sharp lessons for legal and commercial teams alike:

- 1. Contracts speak for themselves** — The intent of parties must be clear on the face of the agreement.
- 2. Appellate restraint** — A second appellate court (like the Supreme Court) will rarely interfere with concurrent factual findings unless justice is clearly at stake.
- 3. No standing in strangers' contracts** — Parties cannot hinge their claims on agreements they were not party to, no matter how relevant they may seem.

## Discussion & Reflection

Moderated by Bernard, the post-presentation discussion drew attention to the implications for public-private partnerships, especially in infrastructure-heavy projects. Participants explored how this precedent reinforces the critical role of precise drafting, particularly in timelines, obligations, and dependencies.

## Conclusion: A Cautionary Tale in Contract Clarity

The Supreme Court dismissed PVI's appeal, confirming that no breach had occurred and awarding no damages. The key message was unmistakable: If it's not in the contract, don't expect the court to find it for you.

As the team reflected, this case serves as a timely reminder to draft with precision, anticipate future bottlenecks, and avoid assumptions because in contract law, what's written is what wins.

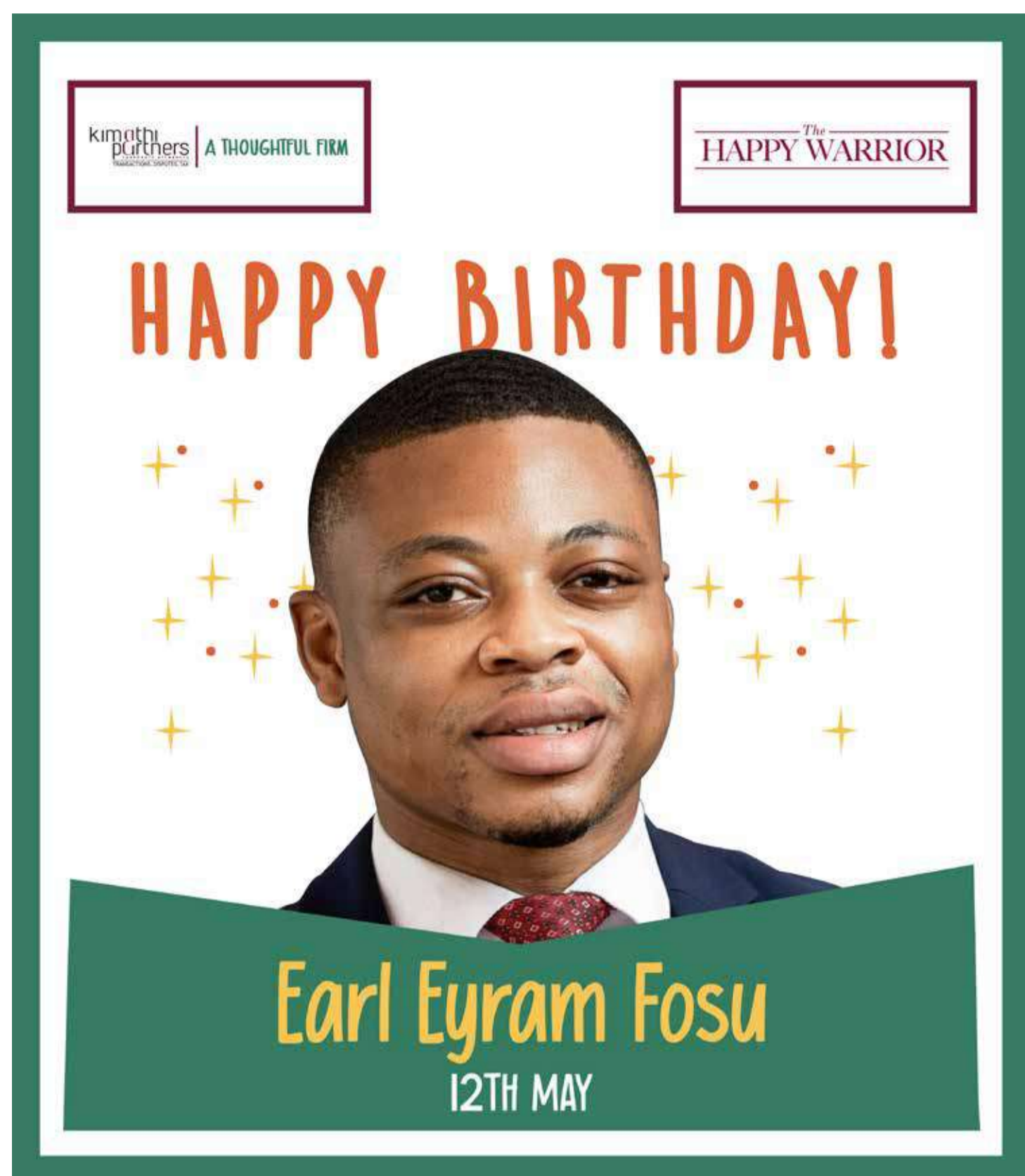

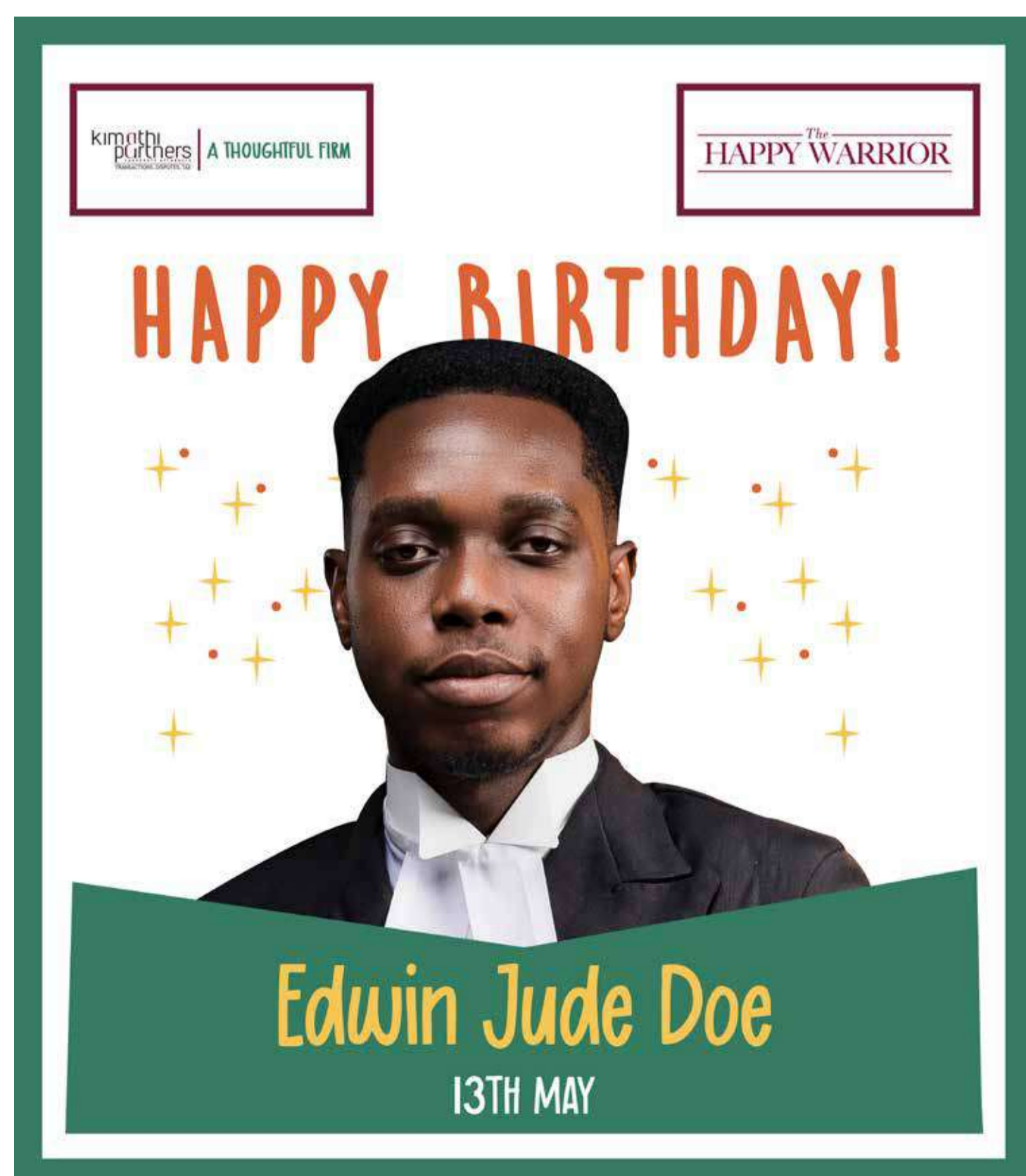

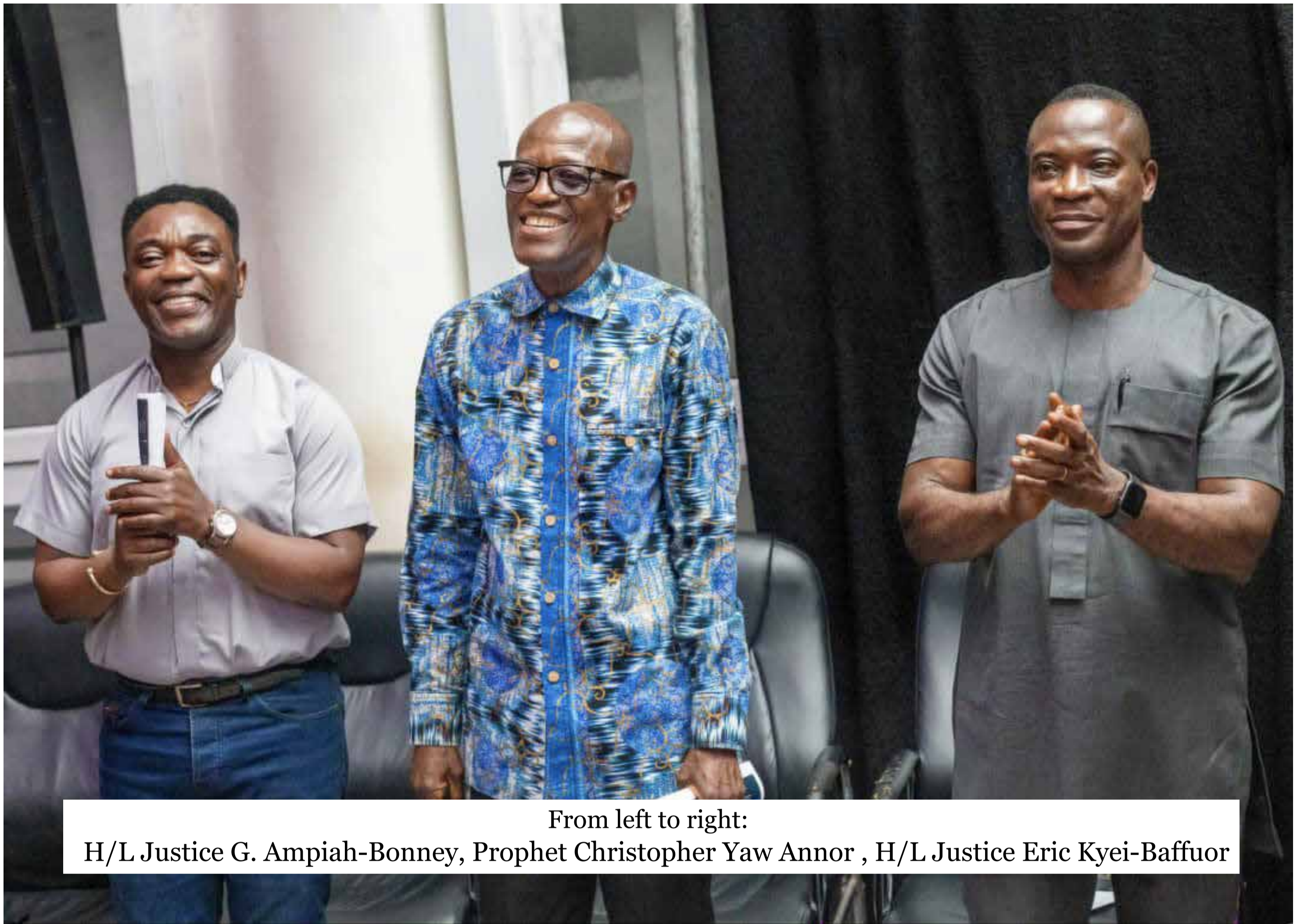
