The sermon was delivered by Knight Achiaab and focused on the theme of faith in God and the importance of persisting in our belief that God will hear our cries and respond to our calls.

He emphasized that faith begins where sight ends. The widow in Luke 18 had no power, no status, and no husband to defend her, yet she had faith. She believed that if she continued to seek justice, her situation would change. Similarly, Abraham waited for years for the promise of a son, and Joseph endured slavery and imprisonment, holding on to his faith.

Knight Achiaab noted that every breakthrough in Scripture followed a period of persistence: Noah kept building the ark until the rain came, Elijah continued to pray until the cloud appeared, and the Canaanite woman persisted in pleading until Jesus answered her.

He concluded that faith that refuses to give up is the kind of faith that is rewarded by heaven. Galatians 6:9 reminds us, “Let us not grow weary in doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not give up.” Your “due season” may not arrive overnight, but it will come.

FROM FIREWALLS TO COURTROOMS: A Deep Dive into Ghana's Cybersecurity Law

Her discussion then turned to Ghana's cybersecurity regulatory framework under the Cybersecurity Act, 2020 (Act 1038). The Cybersecurity Authority (CSA), she noted, stands at the center of this framework. The CSA is responsible for regulating service providers, certifying professionals, and even protecting children online. The introduction of Sectoral Computer Emergency Response Teams (CERTs) across key sectors, from finance to energy, reflects the seriousness with which Ghana now treats its digital frontiers.



Last Wednesday's CLE session was one for the books. Esmeralda took us on a riveting journey through Ghana's evolving cybersecurity landscape, unpacking how the country is moving from protection to prosecution. With Jude deftly moderating the session, what could have been a technical labyrinth became a masterclass in clarity and engagement.

Esmeralda began by demystifying the buzzword that defines our digital age: cybersecurity. Far from being an abstract IT concept, she explained it as the daily shield between our systems, data, and the ever-creative cyber villains lurking in virtual shadows. From ransomware to phishing and denial-of-service attacks, the room quickly learned that cyber threats are not just the concern of techies. Everyone must be concerned about cyber threats.

But the real stir came with her walkthrough of the Cybersecurity (Amendment) Bill, 2025. This is a proposed legal evolution that would expand the CSA's powers from policy oversight to prosecution. Under the Bill, the Authority could investigate cybercrimes, seize assets, and even initiate prosecutions with the Attorney-General's authority. Esmeralda drew attention to new frontiers such as AI, blockchain, and cloud technologies, which the Bill ambitiously seeks to bring under the umbrella of certification and regulation.

Still, the conversation was not without critique. Esmeralda raised thought-provoking questions about the CSA's potential shift from regulator to enforcer blurring the lines between executive oversight and prosecutorial authority. Would this dual role strengthen accountability, or risk overreach? And with the Bill proposing that 50% of fines feed directly into the Cybersecurity Fund, could financial incentives compromise impartiality? These were the kinds of reflections that kept the audience leaning forward.



The session also touched on the Bill's broader social consciousness with fresh emphasis on protecting women, children, and vulnerable persons from online exploitation and harassment. In Esmeralda's words, "Ghana's digital law is growing teeth but must learn to bite fairly".

As Jude closed the session, one could sense the intellectual buzz in the room. What began as a discussion about code and crime evolved into a deeper conversation about rights, regulation, and responsibility in the digital age. In the end, participants left with a clearer picture of Ghana's cybersecurity law, not just as a set of prohibitions, but as a living framework balancing protection, privacy, and progress. And as the digital landscape continues to expand, one thing became clear: cybersecurity is no longer just a tech issue. It's a legal frontier and Ghana is stepping boldly into it.



Case Conference

MOCHCOM LIMITED V. CYPRESS INVESTMENTS LTD

A case that has significant implications for appellate practice, particularly regarding jurisdiction, procedure, and statutory interpretation.



Last week's case conference reviewed the Supreme Court decision in Mochcom Limited v. Cypress Investments Ltd. (Civil Appeal No. J4/42/2023, dated 4th June 2024), a case that has significant implications for appellate practice, particularly regarding jurisdiction, procedure, and statutory interpretation. The matter was heard before their Lordships P. Baffoe-Bonnie JSC (Presiding), M. Owusu (Ms.) JSC, E.Y. Gaewu JSC, H. Kwofie JSC, and Y. Darko Asare JSC.

The dispute originated from an action filed by Mochcom Limited against Cypress Investments Ltd. at the High Court, Tema, on 4th December 2020. The plaintiff sought damages for breach of contract and interest on the sum of USD 812,606.23, among other reliefs. Following the dismissal of the defendant's preliminary application for transfer under Section 105 of the Courts Act, 1993 (Act 459), and Order 3 Rules 1 and 2 of C.I. 47, the defendant filed several interlocutory applications, including one for stay of proceedings, which were all dismissed at both the High Court and the Court of Appeal.

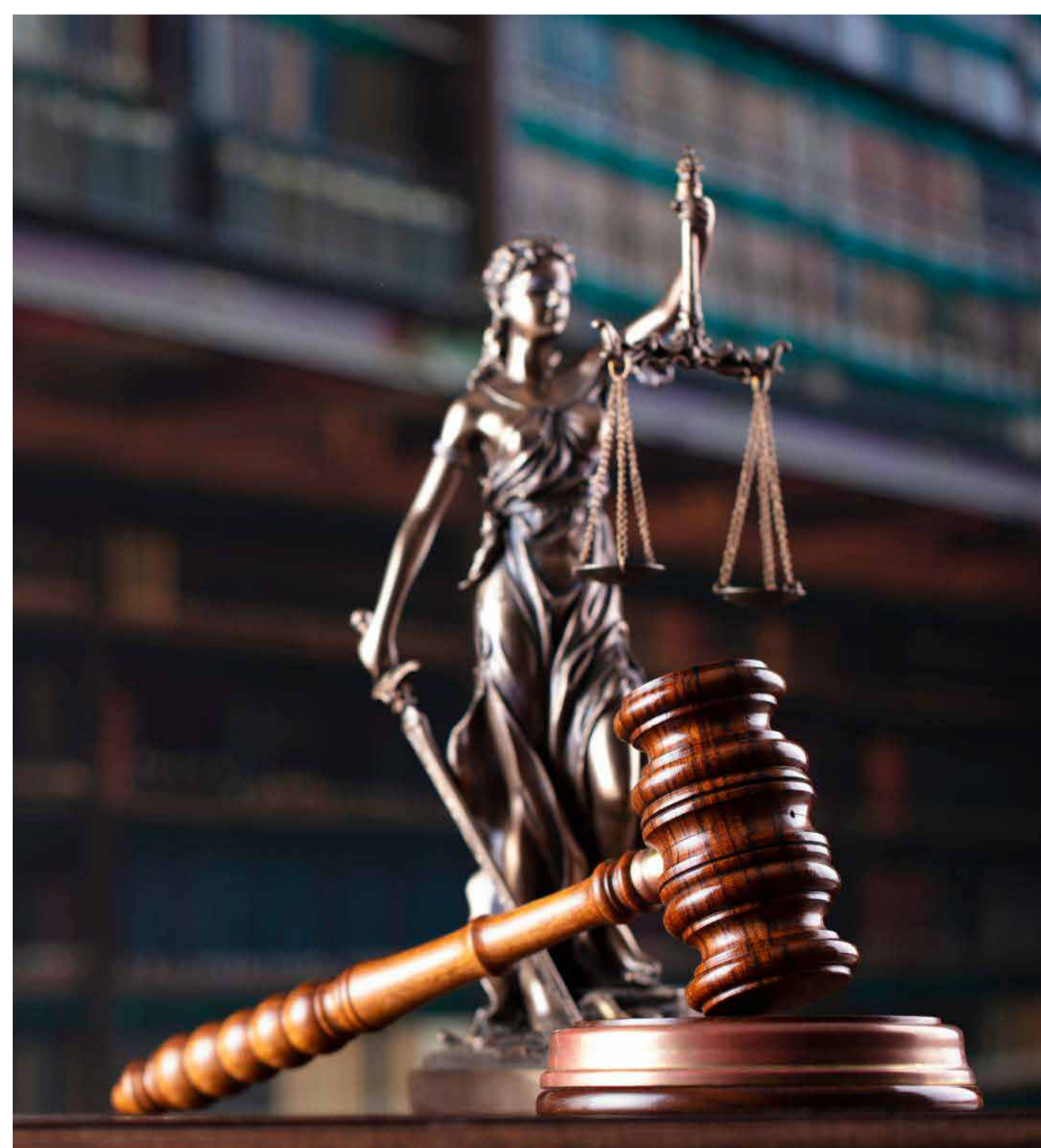
The Court of Appeal's dismissal was particularly based on the ground that its jurisdiction to entertain repeat applications for stay of proceedings pending appeal had been revoked by the Court of Appeal (Amendment) Rules, 2020 (C.I. 132). Dissatisfied with that ruling, the defendant sought and obtained special leave to appeal to the Supreme Court under Article 131(2) of the 1992 Constitution and Section 4(2) of Act 459. The appeal challenged both the Court of Appeal's finding on jurisdiction and the award of costs of GH¢3,000 against the defendant.

The Supreme Court allowed the appeal, holding that the Court of Appeal retains inherent jurisdiction to hear and determine repeat applications for stay of proceedings pending appeal, even after the revocation of Rules 27A and 28 of C.I. 19 by C.I. 132. The Court reasoned that such jurisdiction is innate to the Court of Appeal and cumulative with statutory provisions, and that it was never ousted by the amendment. The Supreme Court emphasized that while procedural rules may regulate how jurisdiction is exercised, they do not extinguish the jurisdiction itself unless expressly stated by statute. The Court therefore remitted the matter to the Court of Appeal for a determination of the stay application on its merits and set aside the costs previously awarded.

In its reasoning, the Supreme Court underscored that the inherent jurisdiction of a court remains intact even where procedural rules are revoked. It also reaffirmed the settled practice that a party whose stay application has been refused at a lower court may repeat the application before the appellate court, even prior to the transmission of the record of appeal. The Court noted that interpreting procedural amendments in a way that restricts this right would frustrate the administration of justice.

One notable statement from the judgment was that, "While rule 27A of C.I. 19 regulates the exercise by the Court of Appeal of its inherent jurisdiction, the exercise of the jurisdiction itself, as the designation imports, is innate to the court itself." This quotation captures the essence of the Supreme Court's position that inherent powers of a court cannot be nullified by mere procedural amendments.

The significance of this decision lies in its clear reaffirmation that the revocation of specific procedural rules does not extinguish a court's inherent jurisdiction, especially in interlocutory matters such as applications for stay pending appeal. For practitioners, this ruling strengthens litigation strategy by confirming that parties retain the right to repeat applications before appellate courts even when procedural frameworks change. For our firm, the decision serves as a valuable reminder to always assess both the statutory and inherent bases of jurisdiction when advising clients or pursuing interlocutory reliefs in appellate proceedings.





TGIF Highlights

EVERY STORY IS UNIQUE, EVERY JOURNEY MATTERS

Last Friday's TGIF was not just another end-of-week unwind; it was a moment of reflection, compassion, and awareness as the firm marked the climax of Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Under the theme "Every Story Is Unique, Every Journey Matters," the session brought together staff for an honest and inspiring panel discussion on breast cancer: its realities, misconceptions, and the role we all play in early detection and support.

The session was moderated by Danso and Abigail, who skillfully guided the conversation with the panelists Aunty Esther, Esinam, Elliott, and Henry. The room carried a quiet attentiveness as stories, insights, and emotions flowed, showing that behind every statistic is a human being with fears, hopes, and a unique journey.

The discussion began by exploring what comes to mind when people hear "breast cancer." From there, the panel delved into practical and emotional questions: how to motivate people to seek early help, what role

faith and culture play, and how to support those living with or recovering from breast cancer.

In the spirit of awareness, Abigail led a lively "Myth or Fact" segment, debunking common misconceptions about breast cancer. It was both educational and eye-opening, revealing how much misinformation persists, even among well-meaning people.

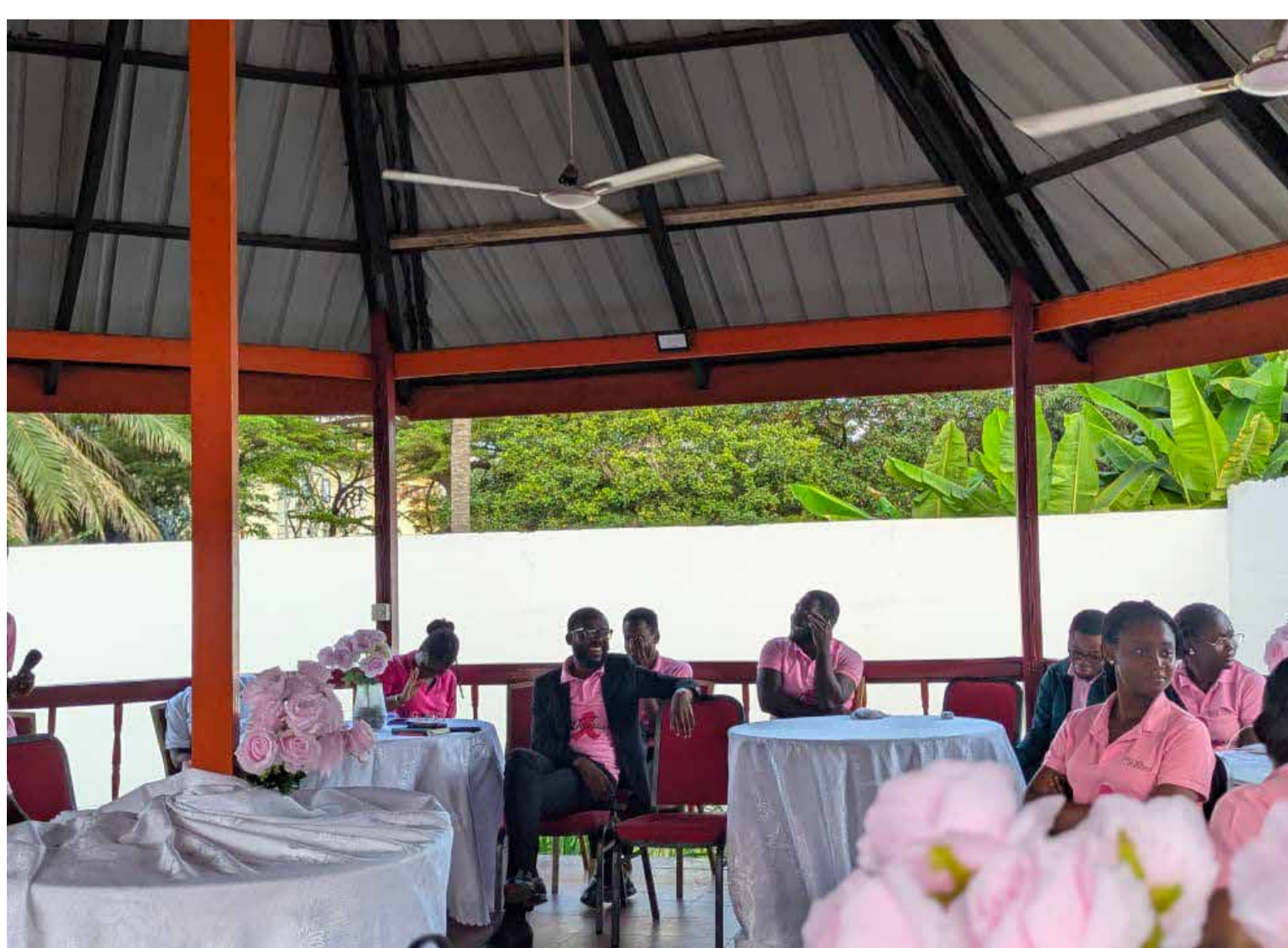
A key theme that emerged was the importance of early screening. The panel encouraged regular medical check-ups and discouraged the common tendency to overspiritualize illness. The message was clear; faith and medicine are not adversaries but partners in the fight for health. Participants noted that fear, stigma, and financial barriers often prevent early detection, but awareness, empathy, and community support can make all the difference.

One of the most moving moments came when the conversation turned to how to support someone diagnosed with breast cancer. The

consensus was simple yet profound: show love, offer presence, and help practically. Emotional and psychological support, the panel emphasized, can be just as powerful as medical care. Partners, family, and friends play a vital role in restoring confidence and hope.

The dialogue also tackled a subject many shy away from which is the role of faith and culture in shaping health decisions. Participants observed that cultural taboos and misconceptions often keep people from seeking medical help. Some rely solely on prayer or traditional remedies, while others are held back by modesty or misinformation. The audience engaged passionately, with colleagues sharing personal experiences and perspectives that brought the topic to life.

One of the most touching moments of the afternoon came when one of our Warriors shared a deeply personal story about a close cousin who lost her life to breast cancer. He reflected that the disease had always felt distant until it hit home with her passing. Though her condition was detected early, she may not have pursued all the necessary medical steps, perhaps due to an overreliance on divine healing. Her passing, he said, was a painful reminder that faith should never replace medicine but rather accompany it. His



story left the room quiet and reflective, stirring emotions and reminding everyone how real and close to home the issue truly is. From stories of loss to reflections on societal conditioning, each contribution underscored how much more work remains to be done in education and advocacy.

As the discussion drew to a close, the focus shifted to solutions. Participants called for continuous education, more open conversations, and stronger involvement from religious and community leaders. It was noted that the church can be a powerful ally using its influence to inform rather than instill fear. The call was for everyone, regardless of gender, to be proactive in awareness, self-examination, and mutual support.

By the end of the session, the atmosphere was one of resolve and a shared understanding that awareness saves lives and that compassion sustains hope. Every story truly is unique, and every journey, no matter how painful, deserves empathy and attention. As the pink ribbons faded into November, the message from Kimathi & Partners remained vivid: check early, talk openly, support deeply. Because when it comes to breast cancer, silence is never strength, awareness is.

PRESIDENT MAHAMA DIRECTS THAT ALL GRA/SML CONTRACTS SHOULD BE CANCELLED

President John Dramani Mahama has ordered the immediate termination of all contracts between the Ghana Revenue Authority (GRA) and Strategic Mobilisation Ghana Limited (SML). This decision follows an investigation by the Office of the Special Prosecutor (OSP) into the controversial agreements.

Dr. Callistus Mahama, Secretary to the President, communicated this directive in a letter to the Ministry of Finance and the GRA, emphasizing the urgency of terminating the contracts. The OSP's investiga-

tion was prompted by public concerns regarding the procurement process and financial terms associated with SML, which was engaged in revenue assurance for the petroleum and minerals sectors.

The contracts, criticized for lacking transparency, are now to be swiftly terminated to prevent disruption in revenue mobilization. This step is seen as an effort to uphold accountability and good governance. The President's Office has assured that the state's interests will be protected throughout the process.

NEW L.I. TO STOP MINING IN FOREST RESERVES LAID IN PARLIAMENT



The Minister of Lands and Natural Resources, Emmanuel Armah Kofi-Buah, has introduced a new legislative instrument (L.I. 2505) in Parliament to prohibit mining in forest reserves. This Environmental Protection (Mining in Forest Reserves) (Revocation Instrument, 2025) will come into effect after 21 sitting days and will revoke the previous L.I. 2462 established in 2022.

The move follows significant public outcry, leading to the amendment of L.I. 2462 to limit presidential powers over mining in these areas. Kofi-Buah emphasized the government's commitment to environmental protection, stating that after consultations, it was decided to completely revoke the earlier instrument and revert to guidelines established in 2020. The administration aims to protect Ghana's forests and water bodies.

ASSIBEY ANTWI GRANTED GH¢800M BAIL - EX-BUFFER STOCK CEO ON GH¢150M BAIL

The Accra High Court has granted GH¢800 million bail to Osei Assibey Antwi, the former Executive Director of the National Service Authority (NSA), accused of authorizing payments of over GH¢500 million in allowances to more than 60,000 non-existent national service personnel.

Additionally, former NAFCO CEO Hanan Abdul-Wahab Aludiba was granted GH¢150 million bail for allegedly causing a financial loss of over GH¢60 million intended for the school feeding program.

Justice Kizita Naa Koowa Quarshie set bail conditions for Antwi, requiring him to provide six

sureties with equivalent landed property, deposit national identity cards at the court, report to police on specified Wednesdays, and be placed on the Ghana Immigration Service's stop list, restricting foreign travel.

During the bail hearing, Antwi's lawyer argued for self-recognisance bail to enable him to prove his innocence. The Deputy Attorney-General noted the seriousness of the offenses, citing substantial amounts of misappropriated funds.

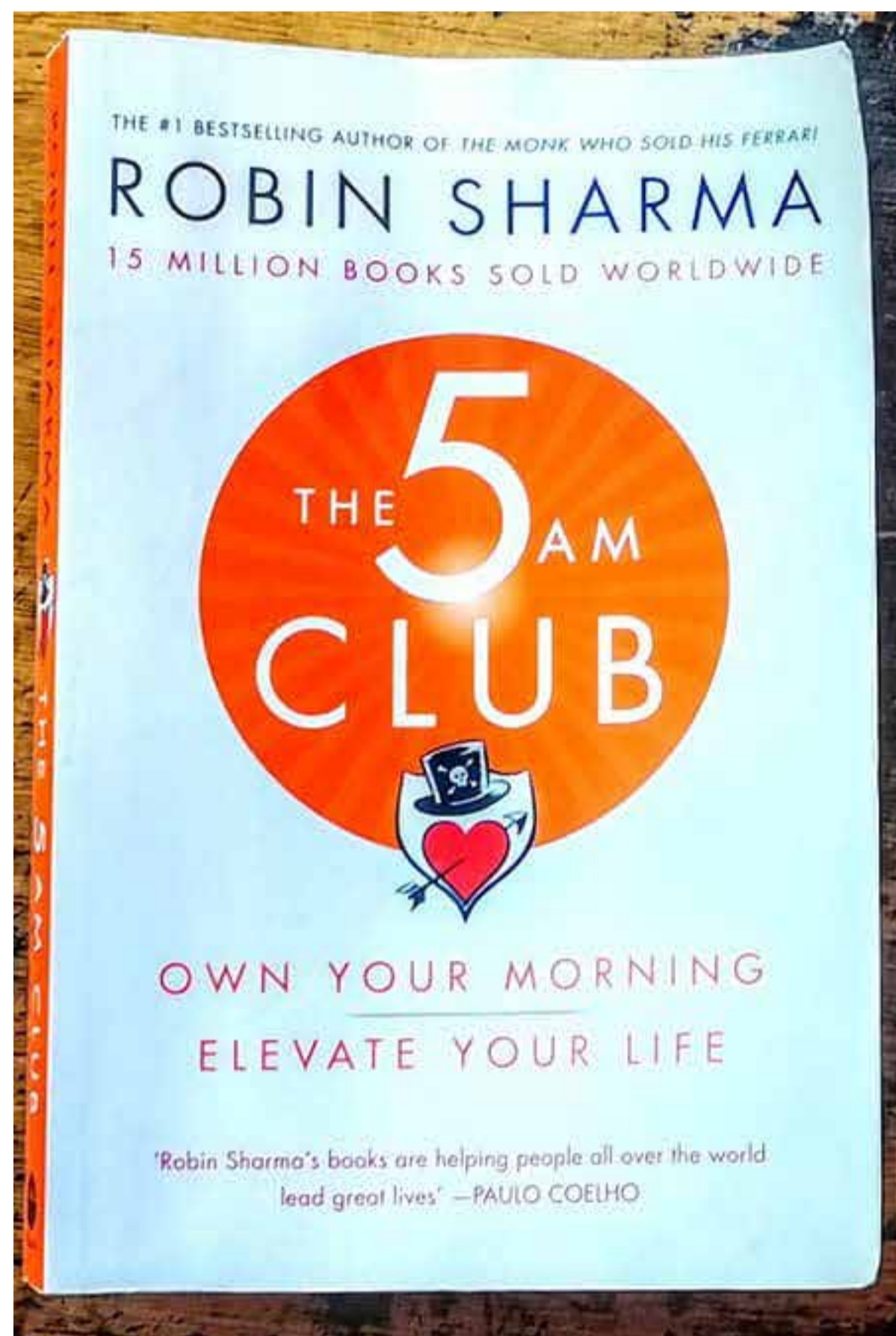

The 5AM Club: Own Your Morning Elevate Your Life

Brief summary of the book

In a fictional setting, author Robin Sharma outlines the importance of a morning routine to productivity. Through the eyes of an entrepreneur learning from an eccentric billionaire, the reader is taken through a journey on how best to maximize mornings to create success.

key insights

1. The author explains that daily application of a 20/20/20 Formula after waking up at 5am is what makes waking up early in the morning powerful. The formula breaks down the first hour of the day into three 20-minute blocks. The first 20 minutes is for a person to move through exercise. The second twenty minutes are to be used to reflect through prayer or meditation. The third twenty-minute block is to be used for growth through reading and listening to audiobooks or podcasts.
2. Sharma shares a habit installation protocol made up of three stages. Overall, the habit installation protocol lasts 66 days, with each stage taking up 22 days. The first stage is destruction, which requires a person overcome old habits. The second stage, installation, involves temptation to return to the old habits. The final stage, integration, is where the new habit has become a part of the daily routine.
3. The author pushes another learning model, the twin cycles of elite performance. The two parts of this model are to push hard during peak productivity and recharging fully. The first part requires that a person put all of their effort into their work, but it is balanced out by the second which requires the person to take proper breaks for rest and leisure. This balance is meant to create excellence and avoid burnout.

Short note on why we should read it and what makes it special

A key takeaway from the book is that proactivity and intentional living will lead to a successful life. Sharma's concept of planning your mornings is a gateway to understanding that you are to decide what happens in your life rather than being led by your life.

CHELSEA'S JOSH ACHEAMPONG TARGETED BY GHANA



Chelsea defender Josh Acheampong, 19, is being pursued by Ghana's national team ahead of next summer's World Cup. He has been making strides at Chelsea, starting in recent matches against Liverpool and Nottingham Forest. Ghana aims to secure his participation as they prepare for the World Cup, having not qualified for the 2025 Africa Cup of Nations.

After scoring his first senior goal at Forest, Acheampong commented, "We worked on set-pieces... I just wanted to make sure we got the win before I celebrated too much."

STRENGTH BEHIND BARS: GAF BRINGS ARMWRESTLING FEVER TO NSAWAM PRISONS

The Ghana Armwrestling Federation (GAF) sparked excitement at Nsawam Medium Security Prisons with the inaugural "Prison Battle" championship, aimed at promoting rehabilitation through sports. Under the theme "Using Sports as a Tool for Inmates' Reformation," the event is part of the "Prison 360" program by the Ghana Prisons Service.
